From California Department of Public Health Xylazine:

Xylazine test strips (XTS) have recently been developed and are available through BTNX; additional vendors may be added to this list in the future. CDPH has not evaluated the sensitivity or specificity of the XTS; however, the Center for Forensic Science Research & Education has evaluated the XTS available through BTNX and has determined that the test strips are appropriate for drug checking purposes (PDF).

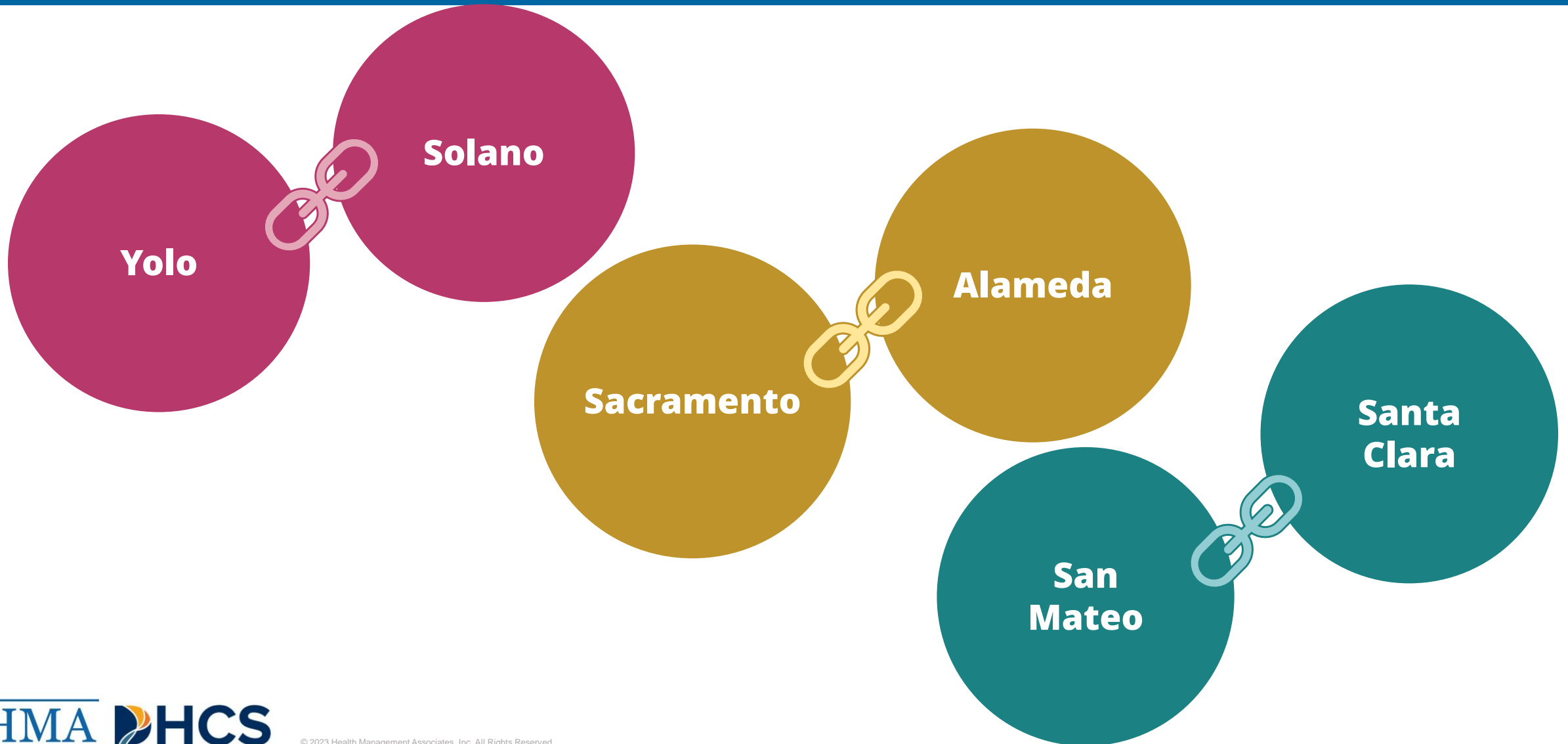

LONG-ACTING INJECTABLE BUPRENORPHINE

- As of May 2023, there are two approved long-acting injectable buprenorphine agents:
 - Sublocade®
 - Monthly Formulation
 - Brixadi®
 - Two formulations approved
 - Weekly injection: 4 dosing options
 - Monthly version: 3 dosing options
 - Will be available September 2023



WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR JAILS?

- More dosing options
- Can start injectable more quickly
 - Decreasing risk of diversion
- Will cost of long-acting injectable buprenorphine decrease due to competition

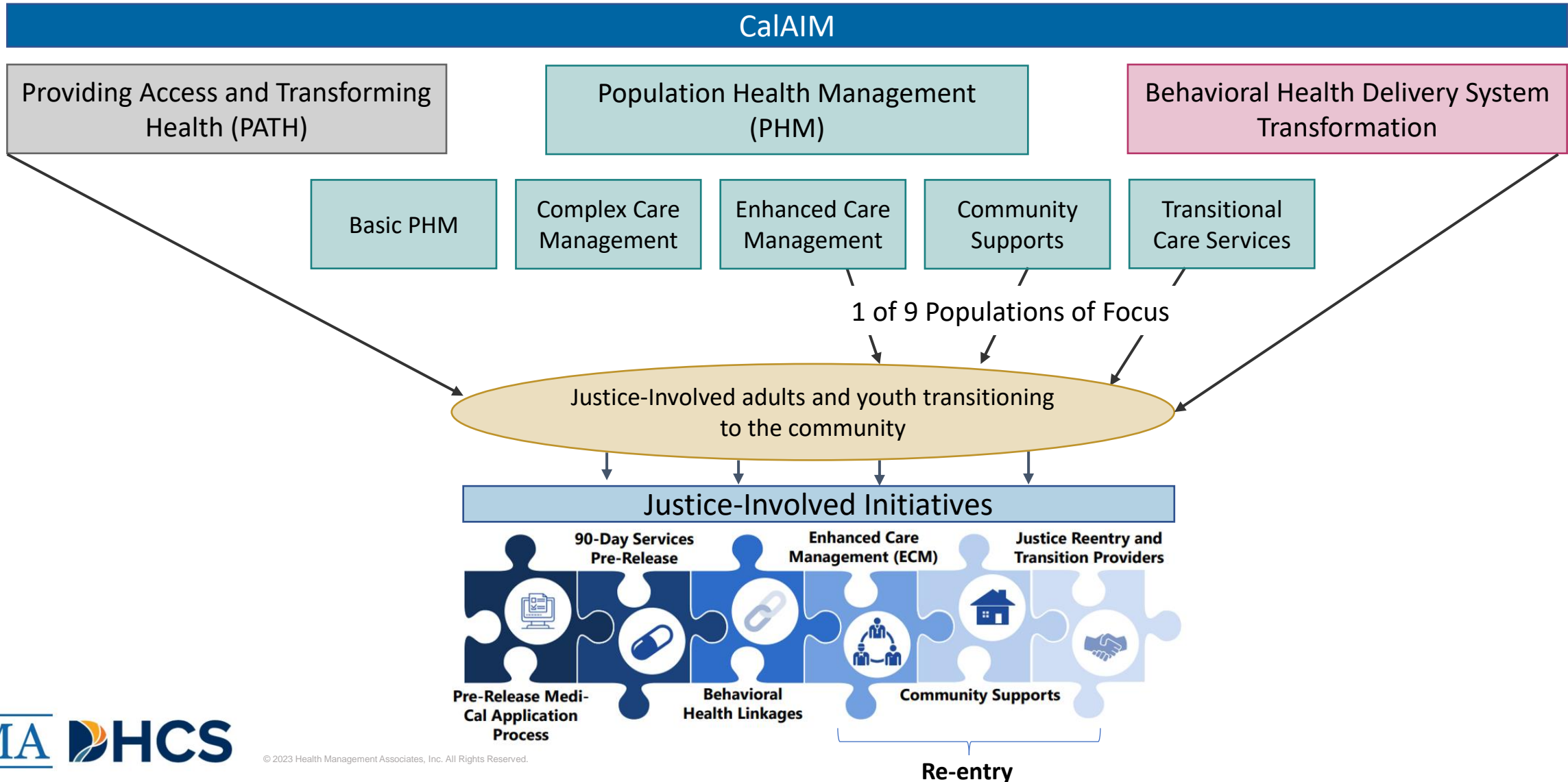

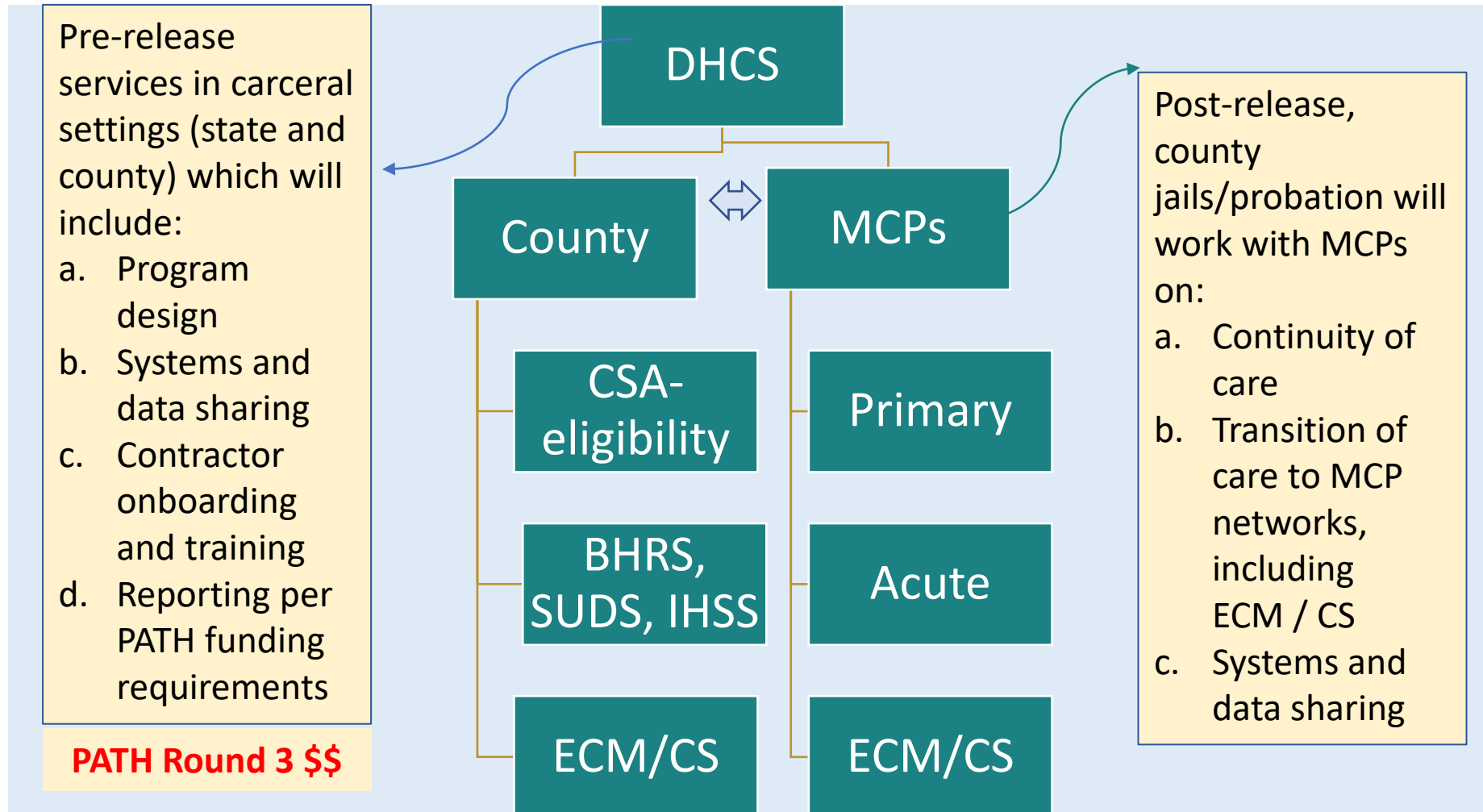

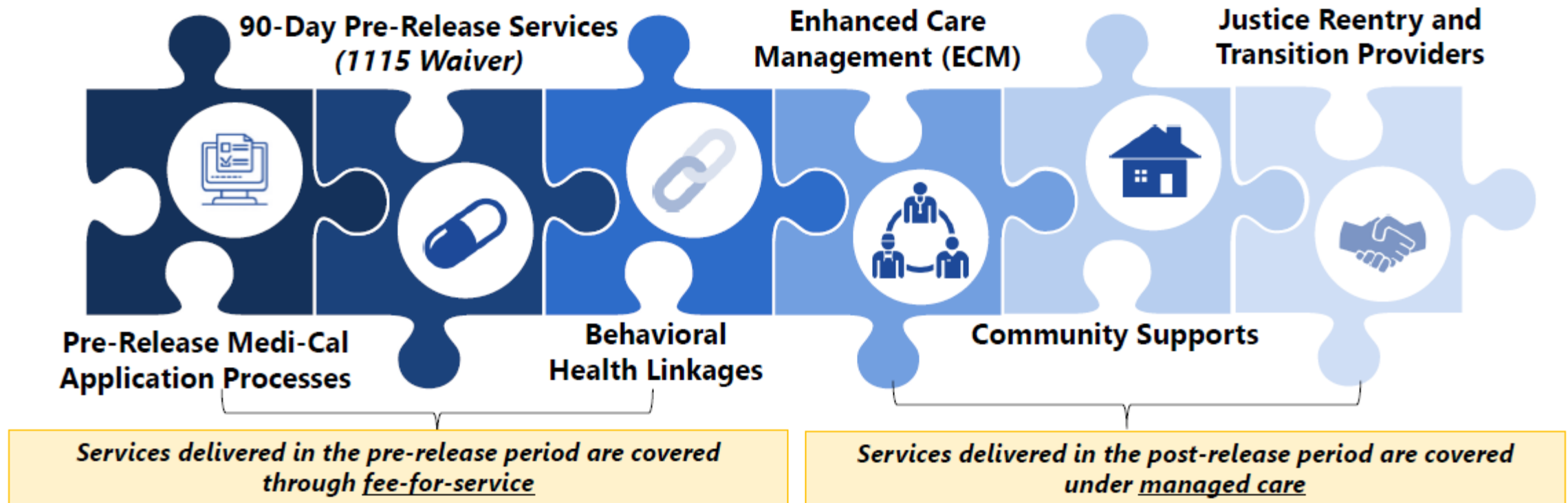

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR 90-DAY PRE-RELEASE SERVICES AND ECM



Eligibility criteria to receive ECM services under the JI POF are the same as to receive pre-release services, so everyone who is eligible to receive pre-release services will also be eligible to receive ECM.

Medi-Cal Eligible:

- Adults
- Parents
- Youth under 19
- Pregnant or postpartum
- Aged
- Blind
- Disabled
- Current children and youth in foster care
- Former foster care youth up to age 26

CHIP Eligible:

- Youth under 19
- Pregnant or postpartum



Criteria for Pre-Release Medi-Cal Services

Incarcerated individuals must meet the following criteria to receive in-reach services:

- ✓ Be part of a **Medicaid or CHIP Eligibility Group** and
- ✓ Meet **one** of the following health care need criteria (for adults):
 - Mental illness
 - Substance use disorder (SUD)
 - Chronic condition/significant clinical condition
 - Intellectual or developmental disability (I/DD)
 - Traumatic brain injury
 - HIV/AIDS
 - Pregnant or postpartum

Note: All incarcerated youth are able to receive pre-release services and do not need to demonstrate a health care need.

COVERED 90-DAY PRE-RELEASE SERVICES

- Reentry case management services;
- Physical and behavioral health clinical consultation services provided through telehealth or in-person, as needed, to diagnose health conditions, provide treatment, as appropriate, and support pre-release case managers' development of a post-release treatment plan and discharge planning;
- Laboratory and radiology services;
- Medications and medication administration;
- Medications for addiction treatment (MAT), for all Food and Drug Administration-approved medications, including coverage for counseling; and
- Services provided by community health workers with lived experience.






In addition to the pre-release services specified above, qualifying members will also receive **covered outpatient prescribed medications and over-the-counter drugs** (a minimum 30-day supply as clinically appropriate, consistent with the approved Medicaid State Plan) and **durable medical equipment (DME)** upon release, consistent with approved state plan coverage authority and policy.

CORRECTIONAL AGENCIES READINESS ASSESSMENT

- Readiness assessments are due at least five months before go-live for 90-day pre-release services

Readiness Assessment Scoring Rubric

DRAFT: POLICY AND OPERATIONAL GUIDE FOR PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTING CAL AIM JUSTICE-INVOLVED REENTRY INITIATIVE

- On June 15, 2023, DHCS released the draft Policy and Operational Guide for Planning and Implementing CalAIM Justice-Involved Reentry Initiative to the DHCS Cal AIM Justice Advisory Group for stakeholder review.
- This draft guidance memorializes policy and operational requirements for implementing the Medi-Cal Justice-Involved Reentry Initiative.
- It is intended to lay out to implementing stakeholders – correctional facilities, behavioral health agencies, providers, CBOs, and Medi-Cal managed care plans (MCPs) – the policy design and operational processes that will serve as the foundation for implementing this important initiative.
- This complex initiative requires a close working partnership across multiple stakeholders for it to be successful. **To that end, DHCS requests that stakeholders submit written feedback to this guide by June 30, 2023. Feedback should be sent to the Justice Involved Advisory Group inbox (CalAIMJusticeAdvisoryGroup@dhcs.ca.gov).**

INCREASE IN JAIL DEATHS 2000-2019

33% increase in all jail deaths

387% increase in jail deaths related to intoxication

Median length of jail stay prior to dying 1 day

77% who died were not convicted of a crime

Alcohol most common, then opioids

 - medical contracts have measured outcomes
 - continuous quality improvement process

 - Substance use
 - Substance withdrawal
- Assess
 - Substance withdrawal
 - Substance use disorder
- Treat withdrawal
 - Alcohol/ benzodiazepines
 - Medications and support
 - Opioids
 - Medications and support
 - Stimulants- supportive treatment

Withdrawal Severity Assessments

Clinical institute Withdrawal Assessment of Alcohol Revised (CIWA-AR)
Clinical Opioid Withdrawal Scale (COWS)

TREAT WITHDRAWAL

- Polysubstance use is the norm
- All conditions must be treated simultaneously
- Treating all disorders outweighs risk of combining opioids and benzodiazepines

The goal of this project is to increase access to MAT in county jails, drug courts, and the child welfare/juvenile justice systems. The project brings together county teams in a learning collaborative with the objective to improve coordination among all county agencies and providers who serve justice-involved county residents and to develop bridges to further build system capacity to ensure access to effective treatment and recovery supports.

Counties participating in the MAT in Jails and Drug Courts Learning Collaborative receive technical assistance through individualized monthly coaching, topic-specific webinars, quarterly learning collaboratives, office hours, and ad hoc training. CALAIM APPENDIX

BACKGROUND (1 OF 2)

- On January 26, 2023, California became the first state in the nation to receive federal approval to offer a targeted set of Medicaid services to Medi-Cal-eligible youth and adults in state prisons, county jails, and youth correctional facilities (YCFs) for up to 90 days before release.
- Through a federal Medicaid 1115 demonstration waiver approved by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) will partner with state agencies, counties, providers, and community-based organizations (CBOs) to **establish a coordinated community reentry process that will assist people leaving incarceration in connecting to the physical and behavioral health services they need before release and reentering their communities.**

BACKGROUND (2 OF 2)

- The initiative will help California address the healthcare needs of justice-involved (JI) individuals, improve health outcomes, deliver care more efficiently, and advance health equity across the state.
- By providing pre-release and reentry services to individuals who are incarcerated, DHCS aims to improve health outcomes and reduce health disparities.
- Pre-release services will be **anchored in comprehensive care management** and include physical and behavioral health clinical consultation, lab and radiology services, medication-assisted treatment (MAT), medications and medication administration, community health worker (CHW) services, and provision of medications and durable medical equipment (DME) upon release.
