Breakout #1: Helping People Navigate Transitions – Patching the Holes in the Safety Net for Recovery Success:

Law enforcement, drug courts, juvenile justice, and jails are critical partners in the safety net for people who need help. While their primary role is safety and security, having competencies in crisis stabilization, medical and psychiatric triage, withdrawal management, and healthcare treatment (including mental health and substance use disorders [SUD] treatment) are important to align with the community standard of care. Even when all staff capacity and competencies are in place, people experience gaps in the system that lead to risk. This session will explore strategies for safety net partners in the legal, court, juvenile justice, and/or jail systems to effectively identify and manage these high-risk transitions.



Breakout #2: Fundamentals of MAT:

Most jails and drug courts start MAT programs with a single medication for opioid use disorder (MOUD) or by just allowing medication for pregnant women. The science and regulations around MOUD continue to undergo significant changes. How do you progress from where you are currently with ability to offer MOUD for persons in the justice system to aligning with the same options that are available in your community? How do you identify and respond to a person whom you suspect is diverting medication? This session, facilitated by Addiction Psychiatrist Shannon Robinson, MD, will explore the latest updates regarding treatment and risk for persons with opioid use disorder (OUD) for all partners in the justice system (courts, jails, juvenile justice) and child welfare system. Bring your questions about medications for OUD and medication administration and diversion.



Breakout #3: Cross-Sector Partnerships Across Justice System:

Successful transitions along the continuum of care are contingent on multidisciplinary teams that can work together. However, partners can often have diverging goals and may not understand the goals of different system partners, which can have a detrimental effect on partnerships. In this breakout, we will explore how professionals from different teams can support each other in their roles. The criminal justice system is multifaceted and complex, involving various public agencies, nonprofit organizations, and the community and requiring intentional collaboration and communication. In this session, we will explore potential obstacles in this important communication and how county teams are working to improve communication and collaboration.
